Kickers Win Major Indoor Soccer Title; Eagles And Olympics Win; Slovaks Trip Up Maroons By 1-0

The Kickers soccer team came on with a rash of six goals last Sunday to clinch the Major Division indoor soccer championship. Their convincing win over the Youths (6-1) gave them the title one week before the conclusion of the league schedule.

The scoring came via two goals by young Ernst Tschueuer, two by Walter Ronge, and one each by Adolf Bachmeier and Joe Mueller. The lone Youths tally was a self goal by the Kickers' Alfred

Mittle who sent a long pass back to his goal.

When the Kickers netminder reached for it the ball simply passed over his outstretched arms and shoulders to land in the back of the net.

Meanwhile, aiding the Kickers' cause was an upset victory of the Slovaks over second place Maroons. A 1-0 win on a free kick goal scored by John McGuigan was all that was needed to knock the Maroons out of championship contention.

Schwaben and Hansa each registered 1-0 victories. Schwaben topped the Green-Whites on a goal by Armin Hohmann, and Hansa edging the Lions on a goal by Johnny Jatsch.

The sweetest win of the season came to the Eagles when they managed a 2-1 climb over the Wanderers.

It was Wally Koscielny and Eddie Binkowski on the goal firing line. The win gave the Eagles two of their most important points of the season, for it vaulted them into seventh place in the standings, one point ahead of the Wanderers and two ahead of the luckless Lions.

The Eagles still need a tie or a win against Hansa next Sunday in order to remain in Major Division competition next season.

Although Hansa is a much tougher opponent than the Slovaks or Green-Whites who meet the Lions and Wanderers next week, it is expected that the Eagles can at least come through with a tie game.

FIRST DIVISION RACE TO BE DECIDED

The Olympics managed a 2-0 win over Atlas with many scoring opportunities wasted by both teams. A tense and eager Tom Gouvas missed a penalty kick against Atlas and with it the opportunity to increase his scoring leadership.

The Olympics' goals came through Steve Iliadis and Frank Andrioukas. They next face a rugged foe in Fortuna, whose 1-0 loss to the Rams put them back into third place.

Meanwhile, the Schwaben reserve team, playing under the name of Sparta, came through with a 3-0 drubbing of the Norwegians, the Wings whipped the Liths, 2-0, and the Hoosiers gained two points by topping the Vikings, 2-1.

With the Major Division championships already established the fans' interest will concentrate on the Olympics - Fortuna and Rams-

Wings clashes next Sunday. The Olympics need but a tie to clinch the title, while the Rams must win. Indoor soccer, being as predictable as Chicago weather, can come up with many surprises on the last day of league games. Still to be decided is the occupancy of the last three places of the First Division and a battle to stay out of there is in store for the Hoosiers, Atlas and Norge.

With the Liths already resigned to a bitter fate, two of the three teams named will have similar fates before the day ends.

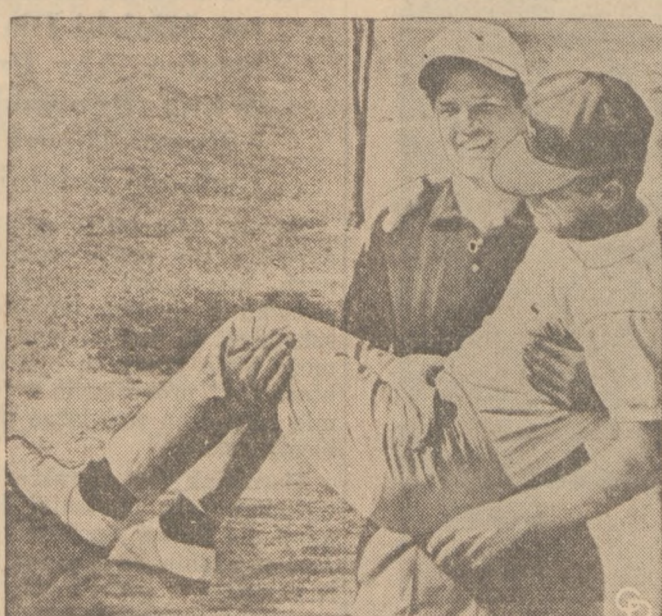

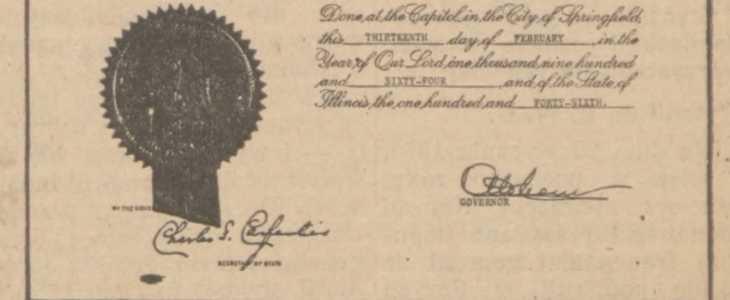

Harness Tracks Of American Champ Series To Feature Best 4-Year Olds

The annual Harness Tracks of America Championship Series, one of the most unique stakes races in American racing, will display the class of the nation's 4-year old trotters and pacers in 21 races at 18 tracks in 1964. The full HTA circuit of three separate series will cover 4,294 miles and carry a total purse distribution of \$300,000.

In addition to showing the best horses and drivers to trotting fans in eight states and Canada, as they have since 1957, the HTA races this year will offer special opportunities to mares in the sport's maturity division, with the introduction of an Empress series for distaff performers only.

The three series to be sponsored by HTA, the 35-member association of major pari-mutuel harness tracks in the U.S. and Canada, all will wind up with championship finals.

Eligibility to the finals must be earned by accumulating points on the preliminary traveling tours. Two of the finals will be \$50,000 races — a Pacing Championship at Chicago's Sportsman's Park July 3 and a Trotting Championship at New York's Roosevelt Raceway September 19 — and the third title race will be a \$15,000 Empress event for pacing mares at Blue Bonnets Raceway in Montreal October 4. All preliminary races will be \$10,000 added money events.

Victory in previous HTA finals has almost invariably led to national championship honors in the 4-year old divisions, and HTA champions have included pacing greats like Bye Bye Byrd, Adios Butler, Belle Acton, Henry T. Adios, Lehigh Hanover and Countess Adios and star trotters like Porterhouse, Elaine Rodney and Lord Gordon.

Red Rush, who has broadcast all Loyola games on WBBM Radio this season, will return to offer authoritative reports of the N.C.A.A. action.

Loyola won the N.C.A.A. title last March by defeating Cincinnati, the defending champions, in the final round of play. The team was selected last week as one of nine to participate in this year's tournament.

NOMINATIONS CLOSE MARCH 15

Although nominations for the 1964 Series will not close until March 15, it is expected that the brilliant 8-year old pacing trio of 1963 — Overtrick, Meadow Skipper and Canada's Country Don — will join trotter Speedy Scot, 1963 Harness Horse of the Year, in heading an all-star entry.

An added feature of the Series this year is the lowest nomination fee ever posted for Series of the value of the 1964 HTA events. On payment — a March 15 nomination of \$50 — makes 4-year olds eligible and no further sustaining or starting payments are required.

Trotting Championship — July 24, Bay State, Foxboro, Mass.; Aug. 7, Mid-America, Columbus, O.; Aug. 14, Hazel Park, Mich.; Aug. 21, Greenwood, Toronto; Aug. 28, Batavia, N.Y.; Sept. 4, Saratoga, N.Y.; Sept. 12, Freehold, N.J.; and Sept. 19, \$50,000 final, Roosevelt Raceway, Westbury, N.Y.
